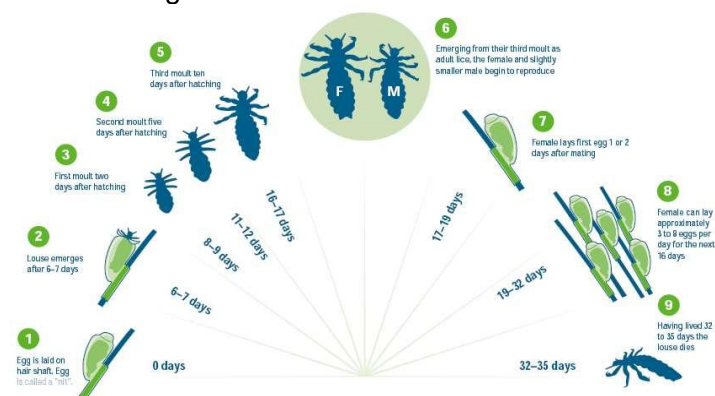
## Good to Be Green

## Head Lice - Symptoms of Head Lice

- Sometimes you don't even notice you have them until you take a closer look. So please do take a closer look
- The most important symptom is of course itching. This is caused by an allergic reaction to the saliva from the louse when it bites you
- It feels like something is moving through your hair, which might tickle a bit
- Red spots on the scalp. These are caused by lice bites, so look for these as well
- Sores on your head which are caused by scratching



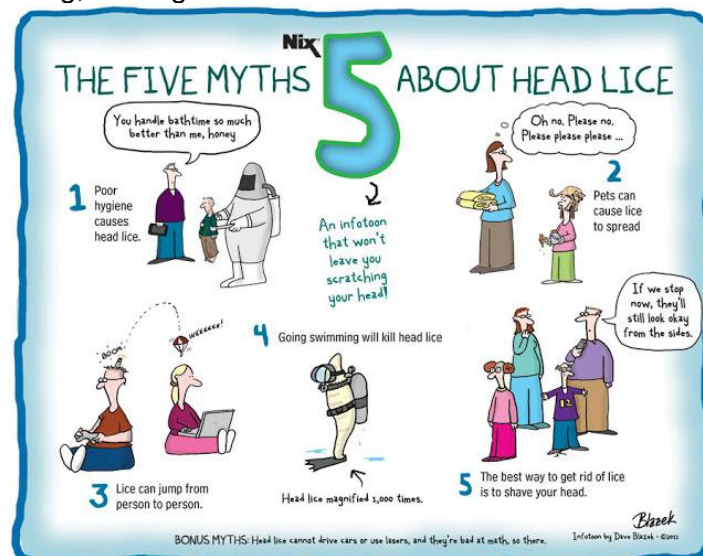
## Detection combing – how to do it

You need:

- Plastic detection comb (from the pharmacist)
  - Good lighting
  - Ordinary comb
1. Wash the hair well and then dry it with a towel. The hair should be damp.
  2. Make sure there is good light. Daylight is best.
  3. Comb the hair with an ordinary comb.
  4. Start with the teeth of the detection comb touching the skin of the scalp at the top of the head. Keeping in contact with the scalp as long as possible, draw the comb carefully towards the edge of the hair.
  5. Look carefully at the teeth of the comb in good light.
  6. Do this over and over again from the top of the head to the edge of the hair in all directions, working round the head.
  7. Do this for several minutes. It takes 10 to 15 minutes to do it properly for each head.
  8. If there are head lice, you will find one or more lice on the teeth of the comb.

Head lice are little insects with moving legs. They are often not much bigger than a pin head, but may be as big as a sesame seed (the seeds on burger buns). Clean the comb under the tap. A nail brush helps to do this.

If you are sure you have found a living louse, check the heads of all the people in your home. Don't treat unless you are sure that you have found a living, moving louse.
