
I wore Hermione's ballroom dress (off Harry Potter) Libby

We were allowed to bring in our favourite book. Some classes read to other classes, we did some book related activities and some classes made their own books. Adults in our classes came dressed in their pyjamas and shared their favourite book with us. We all received a special World Book Day book.

St Piran's Day was also on the same day as World Book Day. We celebrated by having some cream teas in our classes (scones, jam and cream).

Mrs Fenn cooked a special pasty pie for us



which was very yummy! Year 4 and our Reception Class joined classes and made pasties out of apples – they smelt scrummy!

Some classes found out some facts about Saint Piran:

- St Piran is the patron saint of tin-miners and is generally regarded as the national saint of Cornwall.
- St Piran's Flag is a white cross on a black background.
- St Piran's Day is the national day of the people of Cornwall and is held on March 5th.
- According to legend St Piran was born in Ireland in the 6th century.
- St Piran had miraculous powers and a group of kings grew afraid of his powers and threw him into the sea. They put a millstone round his neck and threw him from a cliff into the sea. As he fell thunder and lightening raged around him but, as he reached the sea level, the tempest calmed and he floated on the stone towards the Cornish shore. After days at sea he landed on the beach that bears his name Perranporth... the cove or harbour of St Piran... on the north coast. He built a chapel in the sand dunes and the Cornish people flocked to see him as news of his teachings spread further afield.
- During the late-19th Century modern-day celebrations were started by Celtic revivalists to provide people with a national day of celebration.
- In Grass Valley, California, St Piran's Day is also celebrated to honor the Cornish miners who helped in the mines in the mid 19th century.
- Each year, St Piran's story is retold in a drama on the dunes in Perranporth on the Sunday nearest to March.
